Re: Implementation of Mandatory Electronic Filing in Supreme Court:

Columbia, Rensselaer, and Ulster Counties

Date: September 18, 2019

I am pleased to provide the Bar and other interested persons with an update on the progress of the New York State Courts Electronic Filing System ("NYSCEF"). The implementation of mandatory e-filing in the Supreme Court- Civil Branch in Columbia, Rensselaer, and Ulster Counties has been proposed by the District Administrative Judge of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Judicial District and the County Clerks of Columbia, Rensselaer, and Ulster Counties, to take effect November 20, 2019. To date, there are successful mandatory e-filing programs within the 3<sup>rd</sup> Judicial District in the Supreme and Surrogate's Courts in Albany and Sullivan Counties, and Ulster County Surrogate's Court.

As of the effective date, the authorization will be to implement mandatory e-filing in the Supreme Court in Columbia, Rensselaer, and Ulster Counties to include all new civil action, except:

- CPLR Art. 70 proceedings
- CPLR Art. 78 proceedings
- Election Law proceedings
- matrimonial matters
- Mental Hygiene Law matters
- consumer credit transactions as defined in CPLR 105(f)\*
- residential foreclosure actions as defined in RPAPL 1304\*
   (\*except initial filing of commencement papers by a represented party, which is mandatory)

The District Administrative Judge of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Judicial District and the County Clerks of Columbia, Rensselaer, and Ulster Counties additionally propose to implement consensual effiling programs composed of the seven case types listed above that are not subject to mandatory e-filing, and to include the consensual e-filing of **documents filed subsequent to commencement papers** in consumer credit transactions as defined in CPLR 105(f) and residential foreclosure actions as defined in RPAPL 1304.

Persons wishing to comment on this proposal should e-mail their submissions to <a href="mailto:efilingcomments@nycourts.gov">efilingcomments@nycourts.gov</a> no later than November 1, 2019. A new page has been created on the Unified Court System's website - <a href="www.nycourts.gov/rules/efiling/">www.nycourts.gov/rules/efiling/</a> - to provide notice to the public of proposed new or expanded mandatory e-filing programs and for posting any public comments received on such proposals. As we move forward with the implementation of mandatory e-filing in the Supreme Court in Columbia, Rensselaer, and Ulster Counties, please be assured that we will continue to offer training prior to and after the effective date. The NYSCEF system is intuitive and easy to use, and the training program takes about two hours to complete. Training is offered by staff of the E-Filing Resource Center both on-line and on-site.

On-site training sessions are scheduled as follows, (pre-registration is required): **Thursday, October 3, 2019**, 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM, Ulster County Courthouse, 285 Wall Street, Kingston, NY. 12401

Tuesday, October 15, 2019 – 12:00 PM – 2:00 PM, 3<sup>rd</sup> JD District Administrative Office, 2500 Pond View, Castleton-on-Hudson, NY 12033.

Attorneys participating in an on-site session will receive two CLE credits free of charge. Attorneys, paralegals and interested filers may register on-line for upcoming training sessions.

Please note that Chapter 237 of the Laws of 2015, continues to provide an opt-out mechanism in mandatory e-filing cases for those attorneys who certify in good faith that they lack requisite hardware, electronic connection or technical knowledge to participate in e-filing. However, the law has changed regarding unrepresented litigants as they are now automatically exempt from participating in e-filing and are no longer required to opt out. Unrepresented litigants may however choose to participate in e-filing. E-filing represents an important advance for the courts and the legal profession in New York State.
